

2007 ANNUAL REPORT TRAINING OF COMMUNITY HEALTH COMMITTEES-CHCs

CHCs form part of the foundation of the HBC programme. Members of committees are selected by local communities. They are then trained to participate in the programme and also to serve as HCBCs supervisors. Community participation serves as a cornerstone of any programme project implementation. CHCs training audit was conducted to verify structures that are in place and assess their training needs.

Training committees were established in Zululand and uMkhanyakude Districts.

MONITORING AND SUPPORT OF HCBCs

Monitoring and support (M&S) of HCBCs continues to be one of the most important aspect of assessing performance and outputs. M&S exercise enables KZNPPHC to measure the quality of work performed by HCBCs.

Community meetings were facilitated to give feedback on issues identified during household visits especially those that require broader community intervention.

- **TRAINING OF HCBCs**

Training on National Qualification Framework (NQF) Level 1 is based on Primary Health Care and community Development that aims at health promotion as one of its vital aspect.

INTEGRATED DEVELOPMENT

HIV & AIDS PREVENTION AND AWARENESS PROJECT

OVERVIEW

Integrated development HIV & AIDS prevention and awareness project is a peer field work project funded by Oxfam Australia under the joint HIV & AIDS Programme (JOHAP). The project is implemented at Lotheni, Stepmore, in Hlokozi are of Sisonke District. The project also serves to equip young people who are infected and affected with HIV & AIDS with knowledge and skills that will allow them to make informed sexual health decisions.

TARGETED COMMUNITY RESIDENTIAL UNITS (CTUs)

HIV & AIDS PEER EDUCATORS PROJECT

The Hostel community was the most marginalized sector in the past with facilities set up for the people who have neither life nor families.

The CRU project was initiated in December 1999 to equip the community Residential units with information and skills which would help in behavior change and enable them to make informed decisions regarding their sexual choices resulting in reduction of TB, STI and HIV infection.

The impact Assessment Study was conducted during months of October and November 2007 in 9 CRUs namely; Isu Labasha, Kwa Mashu, Thokoza, Dalton, Jacobs, S J Smith, Umlazi lodge Te Huis, Glebe lands and Umlazi T section in the eThekweni Municipality area.

KEY FINDINGS OF THE STUDY

- The peer-Education part of the project reached a very high proportion of the CRU community,
- The project was much loved by beneficiaries and would like to have it continuing.
- There was a high number of children residing in CRUs.

LEARNERSHIP PROGRAMME

PROGRAMME IMPLEMENTATION

KZNPPHC's relationship with health and welfare seta (HWSETA) was strengthened when 109 learnerships were allocated in 2007. This was based on successful performance of both learners and organization in meeting HWSETA's objectives of promoting skills development.

- 18.2 Ancillary Health Care (AHC) learner ship: 20 learners attended AHC training which started in May 2007. The internship was done in community settings such as clinics and old age homes.
- 18.1 Ancillary Health Care (AHC) learner ship: 40 learners attended AHC training.
- 18.2 Bridging learnership: 13 learners completed first year Bridging training course and they are in 2nd, year training at McCord's Hospital.
- Enrolled Nursing learnership: 26 learners commenced training in February 2007 and will complete in February 2008. Another group of 10 Enrolled Nurses learners successfully completed.

SUPPORT TO OTHER ORGANISATIONS

- **ST CLEMENTS HOME COMMUNITY BASED CARE PROJECT**
This project renders a supportive service to people affected/infected by HIV/AIDS in Clermont and surrounding areas.

INANDA NTUZUMA KWAMASHU (INK)

INK is a Presidential Urban Renewal project aimed at promoting the development of Inanda, Ntuzuma and KWAMASHU areas.

The project is managed by eThekweni.

KZNPPHC was contracted by eThekweni Municipality to train 60 INK Health Workers on Home Based Care. The training was also aligned to HWSETA accredited unit Standard. KZNPPHC was commissioned by ST.CLEMENTS to train 80 volunteers on Home Base Care.

STAFF METTERS

The organization has 31 staff members, 20 of whom are involved in outreach programmes and 11 are in supporting administrative work.
